

they provide the appropriate care for each child ensuring that their personal, social and emotional needs are met.

A journey of discovery...

We believe that children learn best when they are excited and actively engaged, when there is joy in what they are doing and they love learning. Literacy and Numeracy are the backbone of children's learning, with a strong emphasis on ICT which both stimulates and supports learning at all levels.

Children at Silver Springs are taught to develop a range of strategies to solve mathematical problems. Using both paper and pencil methods and mental maths, we concentrate on instilling a real understanding of number and developing a high level of mental agility. We find ways of teaching numeracy to suit the child, giving them the confidence to enjoy and achieve in maths.

Access to the latest technology has become vital in the 21st Century classroom. We have invested in great ICT resources and continue to move forward as technology develops. The children have access to IPad, Kindles, Laptops and other forms of technology to support and enhance their learning. Each classroom has an interactive whiteboard which has revolutionised the way we teach. Teachers have a range of computer tools to help bring many subjects to life inspiring and motivating the children to find out more.

Encouraging children to take an interest in the natural world, to be proactive in protecting the environment and to understand the impact of our everyday lives on the world around them, empowers them to make a genuine difference.

Assessment

Teachers assess a child's progress in all areas of the curriculum on a daily basis. This ascertains achievement and identifies needs so that future work can be planned for the child (Assessment for Learning).

More formal assessments (SATs) take place at the end of each Key Stage (Y2 and Y6). Parents are informed of children's progress and their learning targets at Progress Meetings (Autumn and Spring Terms) and through an end of year report in the Summer Term. There is also a Phonics reading test for Year 1 children with a possible resit in Year 2.

Cross - curricular elements

Certain aspects of the curriculum are not taught through discrete subjects but rather through other aspects of school life. Much of the PDMU (Personal Development and Mutual Understanding Curriculum is delivered in assemblies, at playtimes and lunchtimes, during circle time and through story. The school also invites visitors into the school to help us with these elements e.g. charities, School Nurse etc.

Religious Education

Religious Education is a compulsory subject. The school does not have an affiliation with a particular denomination. The present syllabus is essentially Christian (in accordance with guidelines laid down in the Tameside Syllabus) but includes the beliefs and customs of the major world faiths. Parents are able to withdraw their children from R.E. by notifying the Head teacher in writing.

Each day we have an assembly during which moral values and beliefs are discussed with the children. These assemblies are led by different teachers and by the children themselves on occasion. The assemblies will include a short act of collective worship. In line with statutory requirements and the guidance offered by Tameside LA through its SACRE, collective worship will be mainly of a broadly Christian character though not distinctive of any particular Christian denomination. Parents are able to withdraw their children from assembly by notifying the Head teacher in writing.



Personal Development and Mutual Understanding

The school delivers a comprehensive programme of PDMU to all children. Sex and Relationship Education is taught as part of this programme and involves the following elements:

- Personal hygiene and health
- Puberty and growth (Y5 and Y6)
- Exercise and healthy eating
- Keeping safe
- Drugs education
- Relationships



Y5 and Y6 both boys and girls are taught about puberty. This involves discussion about menstruation and is led by the school nurse supported by the class teachers. We believe that preparation for and coping with the emotional and physical changes of adolescence should begin in the primary school.

If parents would like any more information about the content and nature of the lessons please contact the school. Parents are entitled to withdraw their children from all or part of the sex education provided by the school except that which is required as part of National Curriculum science.

Homework

In the infant classes children are encouraged to take home reading and library books and are occasionally given other projects to work on with their parents connected with areas of learning being covered in school. They also have access to web based learning tools such as Lexia, Doodle Maths and Education City.

In Y3 and Y4 homework is increased to include some mathematics. In Y5 and Y6 children will be given homework on a regular basis in order to help children become ready for homework at High School. A homework timetable is sent to parents at the beginning of the school year. We would like to encourage all parents to be actively involved in their children's homework projects.



Enhancing the curriculum...

It is our belief that healthy and active children are fundamentally better placed to make the most of their education and therefore ensure that all our children have access to a wide range of physical activity, delivered through curricular and extra curricular activities. We have a full-time Sports Coach and a part -time Dance Teacher . Both of whom work closely with the class



teachers to ensure that the children get the very most out of each session.

The children have the opportunity to play a wide variety of sports including, volleyball, cricket, basket-ball and many other team games helping the children to build confidence and self-esteem. The dance teacher works closely with

the class teachers on the children's current topic to provide the children with another way of developing and expressing their understanding and thinking. Both the Sports Coach and Dance Teacher provide a wide variety of after schools clubs, such as girls and boys football, cricket, cheerleading, street dance and multi-sports.

Our enhancement of the curriculum doesn't stop there. As part of our commitment to a broad curriculum we also provide cycling sessions for Reception and Year 5 children in partnership with a British Cycling coach. The children develop good bike handling skills and it also ensures that they learn how to ride their bikes safely wearing the appropriate protection.







Unlocking potential...

We are committed to ensuring that each individual makes the best possible progress and gets the most out of their education, whilst in our care. Learning is focussed on individual pupil's needs and abilities. The knowledge about individual children gathered from teacher's observations and assessments is used to inform how they are taught. Teachers and support staff work together to provide a tailored approach to support children with special educational needs, able gifted and talented children and all minority groups, giving extra support to the children that need it most, drawing on our effective links with other agencies where necessary.

No child should be excluded or disadvantaged because of ethnicity, culture or religion, family background, special needs education , gender or ability. We work in partnership with parents with parents, carers, and children to make sure differences are embraced, understood and respected.

By providing children with a safe, secure, and sustainable environment in which they are encouraged to take risks in their learning and where mistakes and errors are not seen as stumbling blocks but vital stepping stones to unlocking success, the children can grow in confidence and character.

Class Dojo

Our school has high expectations about how children should behave. Class Dojo encourages positive behaviours like perseverance, cooperation and teamwork. Each child has a character which accumulates points awarded by members of staff.

You can download an app on your smartphone or tablet which allows you to see when your child has been awarded a dojo point.

Teachers can also use Class Dojo to communicate with you by instantly sharing messages, updates, photos and even videos from your child's class. It is an easy way to see how (and what!) your child is doing at school and to get in touch with your child's teacher.




Code of conduct

Pupil Premium Spend 2018-2019

At Silver Springs we received **£249,981** in Pupil Premium for the academic year 2018 – 19. This money enables us to close the attainment gap between children who take Free School Meals and those that do not.
